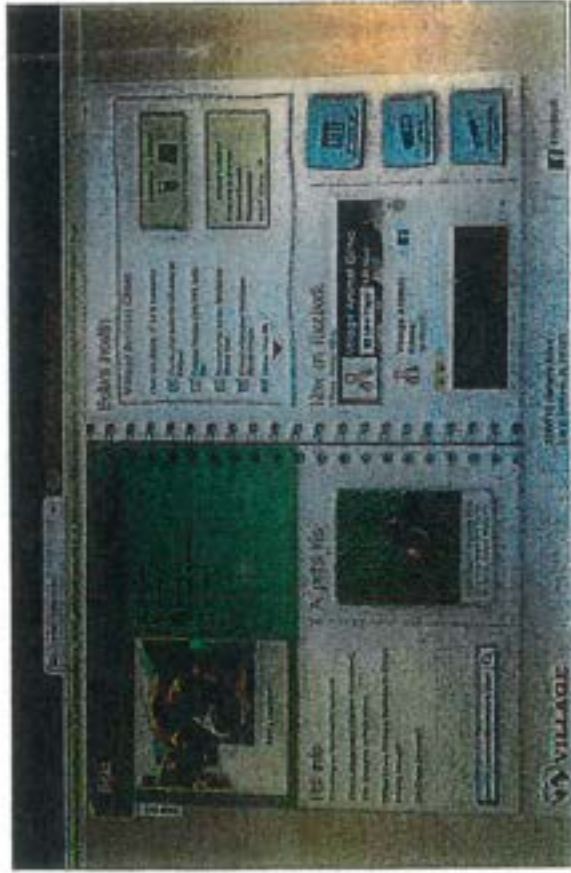

## Dental Care for Your Pet

There are several ways you can care for your pet's teeth every day. Brushing is the most effective and should be done daily. Starting at a young age can help your puppy get used to having his/her teeth brushed early on. It is important to use a toothpaste designed for dogs - *never use human toothpaste, salt, or baking soda as these can be harmful to pets*. Small toothbrushes and even finger brushes designed for animals can be used to brush your pet's teeth.

Oravet Dental Hygiene Chews, CET dental chews, and oral care diets such as Hill's T/D help reduce plaque and tartar build-up on the teeth. Water additives, like Oratene, control bacteria levels in the mouth that lead to plaque formation. The more you can do at home to help take care of your pet's teeth, the happier and healthier your pet will be.

You may start brushing your pet's teeth as soon as you bring him/her home, and you can start using dental chews and other dental products once all of their adult teeth have come in (six months of age).

## Brushing Your Pet's Teeth

STEP 1: Introduce a brushing program gradually. Avoid over-restraining your pet and keep brushing sessions short and positive. A small pet can be held in your lap. Praise and reassure your pet throughout the process.

STEP 2: At first, dip a finger into toothpaste. Rub the soaked finger gently over your pet's mouth and teeth. Make the initial sessions short and positive.

STEP 3: Gradually, introduce gauze over the finger and gently scrub the teeth in a circular motion.

STEP 4: Finally, you can introduce a soft toothbrush. Use a sensitive or ultra-soft brush.

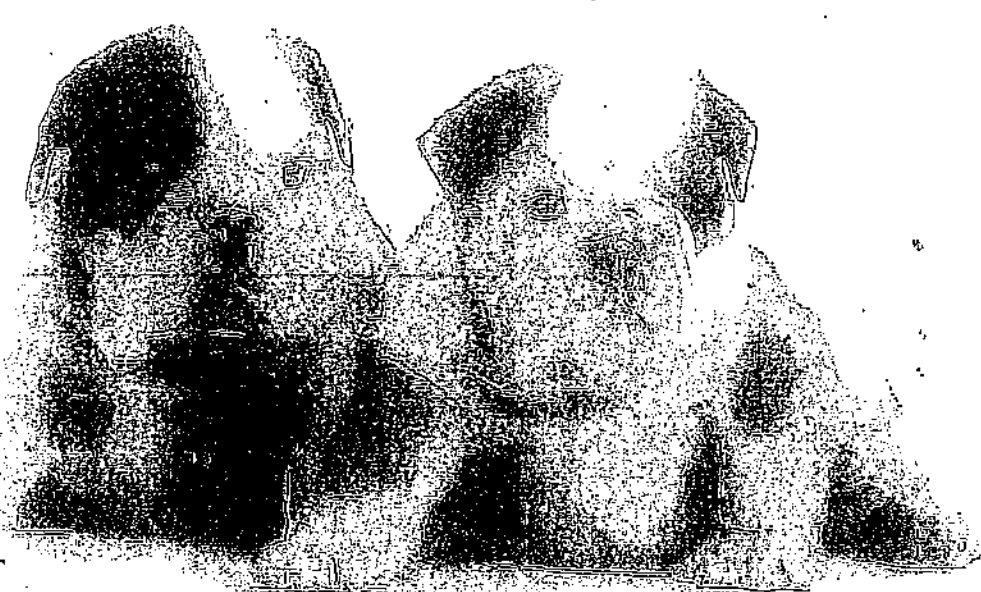
## Dental Cleanings

Dental cleanings may be recommended as early as one year of age in some pets. Dental cleanings, thorough oral examinations under anesthesia, and dental radiographs provide a thorough evaluation of your pet's mouth and allow for the early detection of fractured teeth, infected teeth, bone loss, abnormal pocketing, etc. Many of these things cannot be fully evaluated in a pet while they are awake. Dental radiographs allow us to evaluate the health of not only the crown of the tooth, but also the root of the tooth that is below the gumline and cannot be seen with the naked eye.

# WSAVA Global Nutrition Committee: Guidelines on Selecting Pet Foods



Pet food labels include a lot of required and useful information for veterinary teams and pet owners. They may also include marketing images and phrases that are designed to promote product sales rather than relay nutritional information. This means that some of the information, including unregulated terms such as 'holistic' or 'premium', is of little practical value for nutritional assessment. The veterinary team has a vital role in helping pet owners make informed decisions on the optimal diet for their dog or cat.

## What to look for in a brand

### 1. Do they employ a Nutritionist?

- Appropriate qualifications are either a PhD in Animal Nutrition or Board Certification by the American College of Veterinary Nutrition (ACVN) or the European College of Veterinary Comparative Nutrition (ECVCN).
- What are the Nutritionist's name, qualifications and employment status? Consultants may have limited influence compared to a staff Nutritionist.

### 2. Who formulates the diet?

- Is the recipe developed by an experienced pet food formulator (MS or PhD in Animal Nutrition), a veterinarian, or a pet owner/breeder/trainer?
- Recipe development is a complex process requiring knowledge of nutrition, raw materials, and processing not taught in veterinary school programs.
- Trained and experienced formulators may have a degree (MS/PhD) in food science and technology to help guide ingredient selection and nutrient levels for health or disease management.
- An individual with Board Certification by ACVN or ECVCN may also be cross-trained in pet food formulation or work in collaboration with experienced pet food formulators to help guide ingredient selection and nutrient levels.

### 3. What is the quality control process for ingredients and finished products?

- Diets formulated to meet Association of American Feed Control Officials (AAFCO) or European Pet Food Industry Federation (FEDIAF) guidelines should meet their nutrient profiles. Does the diet meet the profile based on analysis using a nutrient database or on chemical analysis of the finished product?
- Manufacturers and pet food providers should have adequate quality control to ensure companion animal and owner safety. This should include ingredient (food and supplement) validation, final diet nutrient analysis, toxicology, bacteriology, and packaging/shelf-life screenings prior to, during, and after manufacturing.

### 4. What kind of product research or nutrition studies have been conducted? Is it published in peer-reviewed journals?

- Pet food companies are not required to conduct or sponsor nutritional research in order to produce and sell a food, but when they do, it indicates a commitment to animal health and wellness.

## What to look for on a label

### 1. Nutrition Adequacy Statement?

- Is it a complete diet? Foods should be labeled to indicate if they provide a "complete" diet with all required nutrients. The label might also specify if this was determined via life stage feeding trials vs formulation to meet requirements. Those labeled as intended for "short-term", "intermittent", or "complementary" feeding should only be fed as a small portion of the diet (10% or less), or under veterinarian supervision if feeding a therapeutic diet.
- Does the food match the nutritional needs of the individual dog or cat? AAFCO and FEDIAF provide pet food manufacturers with recommended nutrient levels for different life-stages (reproduction, growth, and adult) for healthy dogs or cats. Diets labeled "for all life-stages" are formulated for reproduction and growth.

### 2. How many calories per gram or serving of food?

- Obesity prevalence is increasing in pets in many areas of the world. Having access to accurate pet food caloric content can help prevent unintended overfeeding. Calorie information is only required on pet food labels in the US. Where it is not provided on the label it should be available by contacting the manufacturer or calculating from label nutrient analysis.

### 3. Does the company provide immediate contact information such as a phone number or email address?

- Company representatives should be easily accessible for additional questions, such as the level of specific nutrients not on the label. Pet food companies should be able to provide an "average" or "typical" analysis for all essential nutrients in their food.

### 4. Who makes the food?

- Companies may make their own food (i.e., "Made by") or use a third-party manufacturer (i.e., "Made for" or "Distributed by").



### Puppy Behavior

Certain behaviors in puppies are resolved with age; but others can worsen if not appropriately managed. Aggressive and fearful behaviors (such as growling, snapping, biting, stiffening, and cowering) are not normal puppy behaviors. Once a dog reaches social maturity (at 1-3 years of age), problems are likely to worsen significantly and can potentially progress to aggression. Some red flags include: avoidance, hiding from people, alarm barking, lunging, raised hackles, excessive mouthiness, and confinement problems (unable to settle or repeated urination/bowel movements in crate).

### Puppy Play/Nipping

Cute puppy behaviors may be tolerated or even inadvertently reinforced if you are not careful. Play that involves biting or chasing may increase your puppy's confidence to stand up to you in the future. It is important that you are proactive in teaching your puppy to stop pulling/running/biting when instructed.

When puppies play with other dogs, they get very clear signals about what is acceptable behavior and what is not. You will likely have to help your puppy understand if not properly socialized. Puppies escalate play fighting until one stops as the play has gotten too rough, and you should be prepared the same. To discourage inappropriate behavior you can offer a chew toy whenever you pet your puppy to teach him/her to bite the toy and not your hand. You can also drag a toy on a rope to chase and use treats as a reward when your puppy gives the toy back. To teach your puppy to give kisses instead of biting, you can apply cheese spread or peanut butter to your hand and have them lick it off. It is much more effective to reward proper behavior than to punish any inappropriate behavior. Slapping and/or hitting can cause them to bite down harder and react by playing more aggressively. To prevent inappropriate play, it is important to provide your puppy with plenty of exercise and productive ways to expend all that puppy energy.

### Housetraining/ Crate Training

Often lack of housetraining can be attributed to too much freedom for your puppy too quickly. It is most effective to reward proper behavior (eliminating outside) and minimize the opportunity for accidents in the house by limiting your puppy's access around the house. If accidents are not caught immediately do not say anything- your puppy will not understand why you are upset.

A new puppy can most easily be house trained using a crate. This is a tool that limits their freedom while they are learning to eliminate outside. A general rule is that your puppy should be able to "hold it" one hour per month of age +1. Puppies are most likely to go to the bathroom after they wake up, after they eat, or after a nap. It also helps your puppy to have a consistent daily routine.

### Feeding

Proper nutrition and behavior is established during the early months and it is important that you take the best possible care of your four-legged friend. This begins by not indulging begging behavior (we know it's hard) and giving low calorie treats (like our lean treats). It is important that all of the people in your puppy's life are consistent. Giving into your puppy can lead to obesity which leads to stress on the joints and possible health conditions such as diabetes.

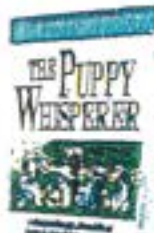

# FEAR FREE PUPPY SOCIALIZATION

## Making Exposure Positive

Use these bingo squares for ideas on how to socialize your puppy. Socialization and exposure are active processes that are most crucial from three to sixteen weeks of age but should continue well beyond this age range. However, it's important to realize that socialization is not simply about exposure—it's about making it fun and positive from the start.

Think of these experiences as a behavioral investment, like placing pennies in a piggy bank. When done properly, your investment will result in a friendly and outgoing dog. Positive, proactive socialization involves liberal use of food treats (or, for some dogs, interactive play with a toy/attention/petting) to help form positive associations.

## Human and Puppy Play

Dogs and people are social creatures. Engaging in activities that are enjoyed together will enhance the relationship between you and your dog. These activities may be in the form of interactive playing, training, or walking. Training should be fun for the dog and incorporate play.

One type of human-dog play is tug. Tug can be an interactive, energetic, and appropriate game to play with your dog. Teaching a dog to enjoy playing tug with you allows the tug to become a useful tool for motivation and reward. When taught correctly, it allows you to contain and control the dog's arousal. Tug is a suitable outlet for play mouthing/biting and it teaches the dog how to play appropriately with people.

### The Tug Game

1. You should initiate and end the game. Have special toys that are used for playing tug that are kept out of the reach of the dog until play time.
2. Give the verbal cue "take it" and present the tug toy. Move the tug toy slightly back and forth to foster interest or chase. Keep the toy at a level that does not require the dog to leap high in the air to try to get the toy. Generally, at the dog's head height or below is a good rule of thumb.
3. When the dog has the toy in his mouth, engage him in a gentle game of tug. Verbally reward his interest in the tug. Motion should be smooth gentle pulls side to side or forward (toward you). Avoid up and down or jerky movements as they can cause injury to the dog. With young dogs, just a soft tug and release will do. For example, you want to tug--- tug--- tug, not TUUUUUUGGGGGG-TUUUUUUGGGGGG. Use caution when a puppy is teething because his mouth will be sensitive.
4. It is OK for the dog to "win" the toy. Sometimes release the toy and back away from the dog while encouraging him to bring the toy back to you.
5. To teach the release of the tug toy on cue: Freeze (stop tugging and any toy movement). Give the verbal cue "drop it" and prompt it with a treat directly under your dog's nose. Reward with the treat for dropping the toy. A marker such as a click or other event marker could be used to mark the precise moment of the release. Pick up the toy.
6. Add the cue, "sit" or "down", and reward the behavior with "take it" and presentation of the tug toy. This helps to control the puppy's arousal while working on manners training at the same time.
7. Repeat the above steps. Eventually, you will delay your presentation of the treat after giving the "drop it" cue.
8. When the game is over, let the dog know by saying something such as, "all done," and engaging him in an independent activity such as searching for treats or playing with another toy independent of you. The tug toy should be placed away and out of sight.

There are a variety of ways to play tug with dogs. Each dog will have individual preferences for the type of toys they play with, how much tugging they like, and how engaged the person is with the play. Some dogs prefer to retrieve the toy and bring it to you without the tug. Retrieving is another form of appropriate play between people and dogs. It too requires monitoring and controlling the arousal level during the

game. Regardless of individual preferences in play the welfare and safety of the dog and person should be at the forefront.

### Helpful hints:

- Use a long tug toy to keep the dog at a distance from your hands and allow you to stand upright while playing.
- Have two identical tug toys. When the dog releases one, pull the other one out and engage him in play.
- The dog may be on leash for control when teaching tug.
- A rope or line attached to the tug is sometimes helpful.

### Side note:

Teaching a dog to play tug will not make him aggressive. Tug can be a physical and mental outlet for energetic dogs. However, do not play tug with dogs that guard objects and/or display aggression with toys. It is not recommended for children to play tug with dogs because the excitement level may be more difficult to control. This should be an adult only game with your dog. There is a risk of accidentally being bitten when playing tug with a dog.
